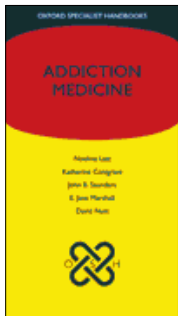

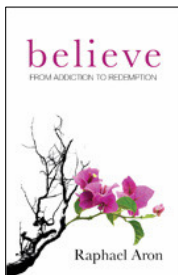

Edited by N. Latt, K Conigrave, J. Marshall, J. Saunders & D. Nutt | Oxford University Press | 2009

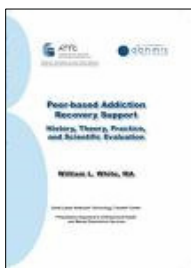

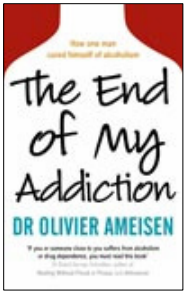

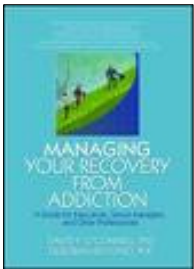

Fearing for his life, he immersed himself in AA, rehab and therapy. Nothing worked. So he did the only thing he could; he took his treatment into his own hands. Searching for a cure for his deadly disease, Dr Ameisen prescribed himself the drug baclofen and experimented with increasingly higher doses until he finally reached a level high enough to leave him free of any craving for alcohol.
